Annex 1 – The conversion threshold The conversion threshold* diagram shows a representation of degradation* leading to the conversion threshold. This needs to be viewed considering the forest type and natural tree coverage in line with the FSC natural forest definition as well as other aspects of forest health considering soils, biodiversity, species composition, structure etc. Critical to determining the conversion threshold is whether the forest type could recover back to natural forest* without (human) intervention. Degradation* can be understood as a state of arrested succession, to be set in contrast to natural systems that undergo constant transitions subject to both neighbourhood effects and natural disturbances. The corollary of this is that a forest is not degraded provided that it retains dynamics that facilitate recovery to former steady states.
